BN still remains the party most preferred by the rural Malay population in Sg Siput with a support rate of 45% to 63%. PKR only received votes from about 14 - 15% of the rural Malay population. This underlines the importance of identifying and effectively addressing the socioeconomic problems being faced by the rural population.

PAS is clearly a potent force with between 23% and 40% of the rural Malay vote. The Pakatan Harapan has to assess and address the issue of Islam. Amanah especially, has to dialogue with and convince this set of voters that Amanah's more inclusive approach (of Maqassid Syariah) is truly Islamic.

The votes cast by the Malay and Chinese voters have been subtracted from the total votes cast using the formula (BN =55%/PKR = 15%/PAS=30%) for Malays and (BN=20%/PKR=80%/PAS=0%) for the Chinese voters in these stations.

Voter turn-out of 75% was assumed and votes cast by the Malay and Indian voters were subtracted from the total votes cast using the formula (BN =55%/PKR = 15%/ PAS=30%) for Malays and (BN=28.9%/PKR=61.8%/PSM=8.4%) for the Indian voters in these stations. 97.9% of the voters in Mahkamah are Chinese so similar calculations were not done for this station.

The results confirm that 85% to 90% of the Chinese voters in Sg Siput voted for Pakatan Harapan. This appears even higher than the support for Pakatan Rakyat in 2013!
